

Many rural youth feel like their voices don't matter so it's important to empower them and make them feel like their voices matter, because they do!


Elevate

Our Mission

What We Do

The Northern California Youth Policy Coalition brings youth into the political discussion by advocating for their needs. We ensure that youth voices are heard, especially in matters that directly involve our community, and in doing so, we empower youth to create a brighter future for Northern California.

How We Are Going to Achieve Our Goal

- 1. Advocate for the perspectives of Northern California youth through direct legislative action, including introducing and supporting legislation at both a federal and state level.
- 2. Through recruitment of active high school students, we are going to form a grassroots coalition of dedicated high school students to highlight the perspectives of youth in Northern California.
 - 3. By actively engaging in our communities through organizing civic activities, we will increase the amount of young people who are actively involved in our communities.

What We've Done

- ★ Advocated on over 20 pieces of legislation in Sacramento
 - SB 721 (Dahle) Promoting CTE Programs In Our Schools
- ★ Advocated for two pieces of legislation in Washington DC
 - Secure Rural Schools Reauthorization Act of 2023
 - IDEA Full Funding Act
- ★ Hosted multiple candidate forums for local and state legislative offices
- ★ Registered hundreds of people to vote/pre-register to vote

Current Broadband Statistics

Rural Access Disparities

Approximately 25% of rural Americans and 10% of Californians lack reliable broadband access, significantly hindering educational and economic opportunities. This gap highlights the urgent need for infrastructure improvements to ensure equitable access to essential online resources for rural communities compared to their urban counterparts.

Impact on Education

Limited broadband access adversely affects students in rural areas, with many unable to complete assignments or participate in online learning. This digital divide contributes to lower enrollment rates in higher education, perpetuating cycles of poverty and limiting future opportunities for rural youth.

Impact of COVID-19 on Broadband Accessibility

- The pandemic has accelerated the dependence on broadband for essential services, including education and healthcare, revealing the critical need for reliable internet access in rural areas to support remote learning and telehealth initiatives.
- The exacerbation of the broadband divide during COVID-19 highlights the urgent need for targeted policy interventions and infrastructure investments to ensure equitable access to high-speed internet, particularly for underserved rural communities.

Washington DC Advocacy

- Secure Rural Schools
 Reauthorization Act of 2023
- IDEA Full Funding Act
- Met with over 20 congressional offices
- Pushed for the passage of IDEA and SRS to ensure a quality education for rural schools








- Extend Secure Rural Schools through 2026
- Ensuring a predictable payment to federally impacted forest counties where the tax base is lower, impacting vital services to the community.
- Providing funding for educational services for students in more than 700 rural counties.
- Preventing the closure of remote rural schools serving small communities and the layoffs of school staff and other public service workers.
- This legislation funds important infrastructure projects, public education, law enforcement, and other essential services to ensure no one in timber-dependent communities gets left behind. I'm proud to help lead this bipartisan bill to reauthorize the SRS program, protect these resources, and further invest in our rural communities.

IDEA Full Funding Act

- IDEA provides services and supports to over 7 million children with disabilities (around 13% of all public school students).
- Over the last decade, the number of children served by IDEA has grown by
 12%
- In FY 2023, Congress funded only 13% of the average per pupil expenditures.

 Help schools better prepare students with disabilities for future employment and an opportunity for independent living.
